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Our Foundation

The Jaywantrao Ghyar Patil Sevabhavi Sanstha (JGPSS) was founded on January 26, 2007, with a deep-rooted commitment to social welfare and inclusive community development in the Hingoli district. Our mission is to empower marginalized communities by facilitating access to essential resources, including education, health services, and sustainable livelihood opportunities.

The organization is proudly led by Shri.

Chandrakant Ghyar Patil, who serves as the Founder, Trustee, and Coordinator, guiding our strategic vision and on-the-ground execution.

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Drought Relief and Water Conservation Program

The Sanstha implemented a critical **Drought Relief and Water Conservation Program** in **Khambala village**, Hingoli, from May 15 to July 15, 2024, supported by **AFARM, Pune**. This initiative focused on community sensitization and strategic intervention to mitigate drought effects and build water resilience. The project engaged **55 households** directly in educational activities.

Key Achievements and Impact

This effort yielded measurable results, improving agricultural output and economic stability:

The doubling of the average farmer income in participating households demonstrates the profound economic impact of effective water conservation. The program included focused training on water-saving irrigation techniques and soil moisture conservation methods. Strategic work was carried out to deepen and rejuvenate existing wells and local water bodies. The resulting increase in the groundwater table has significantly reduced the need for private water tankers during the lean season. Furthermore, the community members have collectively committed to the long-term maintenance of the newly established water structures. This comprehensive approach ensures that water security is sustained beyond the project timeline.

Audit Report: Financials

The expenditure recorded for this program in the F.Y. 2024-25 was **₹20,000.00**, designated as the "Drought Relief Programme (AFARM) Exp."

Water Security Initiative: Gal Mukht Dharan and Gaal Yukt Shivar

In collaboration with the Irrigation Management Sub-Division No. 3, Hingoli, JGPSS executed the **Gal Mukht Dharan (Silt-Free Dam) and Gaal Yukt Shivar (Silt-Rich Farm) Scheme** at the Hadgaon Minor Irrigation Tank, Mouje: Adgaon Bhingi.

The project systematically removed silt and sludge from the tank to **enhance water storage capacity** and distributed the nutrient-rich material to local farmlands, **improving agricultural land fertility**. This successful partnership benefited both water resource management and agricultural sustainability. Initial estimates suggest that approximately **5,000 cubic meters of nutrient-rich silt** were removed and distributed. This initiative directly benefited over **80 local farmers** whose land received the valuable silt, reducing their reliance on expensive chemical fertilizers. The joint effort with the Irrigation Management Sub-Division demonstrated a powerful synergy between the non-profit and government sectors. The increased storage capacity of the tank ensures reliable water availability for irrigation across the command area, securing future Rabi and Kharif crops.

Audit Report: Financials

The largest recorded expenditure on the object of the trust was for this project: **₹779,184.00** ("Gal Mukht Dharan Gal Ukt Shivar Abhiyan Exp.").





Livelihood and Nutrition: Millet Promotion Campaign

In alignment with promoting sustainable food systems, the Sanstha conducted the **Millet Promotion Campaign (September 28 to 30, 2024)**. The focus was on providing vocational training to women beneficiaries in the production and marketing of nutritious, millet-based food products.

Key Activities and Guidance

- **Nutritious Product Training:** Led by **Prof. Rohini Shinde** (Scientist, Home Science Dept., KVK), focusing on practical millet-based recipes.
- **Accounting and Finance Guidance:** Provided by **Shri. Hanuman Jagtap** (Accountant) on financial management and sales tracking.
- **Market and Coordination Support:** Guided by **Shri. Sahebrao Bajad** (Taluka Coordinator, Dhan Foundation) on market linkages and enterprise development.



The initiative empowered women by equipping them with sustainable livelihood skills centered on a highly nutritious, drought-resistant crop. Over **45 local women beneficiaries** participated in the intensive three-day workshop. They were trained in preparing marketable products like millet bhakri mix, biscuits, and energy bars. Following the training, several women formed small self-help groups (SHGs) to pool resources for initial raw material procurement. The campaign highlighted the dual benefit of millets: superior nutrition for families and better economic resilience for farmers. Plans are underway to secure designated stalls for the SHGs at local weekly markets and fairs to ensure sustained sales.

Audit Report: Financials

The expenditure recorded for this campaign was **₹22,600.00** ("Pramotation of Millete Mission Exp.).



4. Climate-Resilient Sustainable Agriculture

The Sanstha, in partnership with **FICCI-SEDF** and **AFARM, Pune**, conducted a series of Farmer's Gatherings (शेतकरी मेळावा) to promote **Climate-Resilient and Low-Cost Sustainable Farming Technology**.

Key Farmer Gatherings

Farmers received guidance from renowned experts, including **Shri. Dadasaheb Khade** and **Shri. Ramesh Sarnaik**, and were provided with **free Sustainable Farming Method Handbooks**. The gatherings provided practical demonstrations of low-cost solutions, such as **seed treatment**, mulching, and the preparation of *Jeevamrut* (natural fertilizer). The core philosophy promoted was reducing input costs and minimizing reliance on external, volatile market resources. Experts like Shri. Dadasaheb Khade focused on linking farmers to existing government livelihood schemes and subsidies. Farmers provided extremely positive feedback, noting the practical and immediately applicable nature of the training. The Kharip season preparation focused on risk mitigation against erratic rainfall patterns through climate-smart choices.

The expenditure recorded for the awareness and training initiatives was ₹14,500.00 ("Climate Adaptable low Cost Sustainable Agri tech Camp").

Community Wellness: International Yoga Day 2024

On **June 21, 2024**, the Sanstha organized a special celebration for **International Yoga Day** to promote physical and mental well-being. The event was held at the newly developed **Amrut Sarovar** (Hadgaon Minor Irrigation Tank) in Mouje Adgaon Bhingi, symbolically linking the importance of a healthy environment with personal health and wellness.

The event saw enthusiastic participation from a diverse group, including local youth, women, elders, and village leaders. The yoga session was led by a certified local instructor, focusing on basic *asanas* and **pranayama** (breathing exercises) suitable for all age groups. Hosting the event at the rejuvenated Amrut Sarovar underscored the theme of community and environmental rejuvenation. This initiative was crucial in promoting mental and emotional well-being, complementing the Sanstha's focus on physical health and livelihood. The success of the event reinforces the Sanstha's commitment to integrating holistic wellness activities into its ongoing community outreach programs.

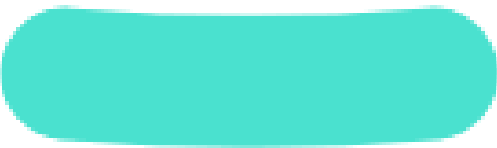
